

Foundational Principles

Preliminary **Equity** Strategies

- 1. Make decisions that ensure the fair and proportional distribution of impacts, opportunities, resources, and costs.
- 2. Demand inclusivity, the practice of including relevant stakeholders and communities, particularly marginalized communities and groups that have been historically left out, in the policymaking and governance process, in order to ensure fair and equitable outcome.
- 3. Authentically involve residents, businesses, and other key stakeholders, particularly marginalized populations, as co-creators in all phases of planning and implementation.
- 4. Partner with cultural brokers and community-based organizations that have established relationships with marginalized communities to ensure authentic engagement; leverage existing community engagement efforts when possible.





Expand green infrastructure to ensure that all neighborhoods have access to green space within a quarter mile by 2030 and a baseline canopy of 25% by 2030 and 35% by 2045, starting with historically marginalized communities and tree-deficient neighborhoods.

Parking lots that are tree-barren vs. tree-abundant.






Washington D.C.

Increase food security and access to healthy, affordable food for all communities while supporting a regenerative food system by sourcing 25% of food locally within a 200-mile radius by 2030 and 40% by 2045, and by reducing 50% of aggregate food waste by 2025 and 75% by 2030.

Waste Not OC Coalition

A public/private effort to to reduce hunger and food waste by safely and cost effectively recovering unwanted food for distribution to local pantries.





Identify climate vulnerabilities and adaptation strategies as part of the Climate Action Plan or General Plan updates by 2022. Develop and implement preparedness measures, with a priority focus initially on increasing the resilience of communities most vulnerable to climate change impacts by investing in existing community assets and networks to increase community adaptive capacity.








Sacramento Community Emergency Response Team

An all-risk, all-hazard training program that educates volunteer members about disaster preparedness for hazards and trains them in basic disaster response skills.







The City of West Sacramento has several cooling centers including the West Sacramento Community Center where they host their annual Senior Resource Fair.






Capital Region Climate Readiness Collaborative
