














Contaminated Water in communities of color

\$52 million total awarded to 12 Prop 1 Funding Areas (IRWM regions within each Funding Area work collaboratively)

Most funds will be expended by 2022, but work needs to continue after that

Key Goals of the Program: **BUILD TRUST AND CAPACITY FOR SUCCESS**

- Identify and engage traditionally "underrepresented" communities
- Provide a seat at the table and a voice in decision making
- Update governance structures & IRWM plans to reflect all communities
- Identify/develop projects & funding opportunities (state, federal, local)

Funded Activities

Category	Examples of Activities
Technical assistance	Service provider trainings, local circuit rider programs to train water/wastewater staff
Needs assessments	Surveys and studies to identify water management needs
Project development	Planning, environmental permitting, and other pre-construction engineering/design
Data collection and analysis	Water quality assessments, median household income surveys, mapping activities
Engagement in IRWM efforts	Regional engagement coordinators, DAC/Tribe Advisory Committees
Governance	Evaluation of existing governance structures and updates to allow more DAC/Tribal representation in decision making processes
Community outreach	Public meetings open to community members, door-to-door outreach (COVID impacts)
Education	Translation and interpretive services, water education campaigns, education for communities based on needs assessment findings
Facilitation	Facilitation of planning processes/meetings/events, translation and interpretive services
IRWM Plan Updates	Development of DAC plan for a Prop 1 Funding Area to be utilized as a unified approach for all IRWM plans in the Funding Area

Findings from the Grant Program

- A. Need for better coordination and integration between State water programs and initiatives, for example between the Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) and the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) programs.
- B. Greater support for the established foundations within IRWM (agreements, plans, projects, relationships) to advance the engagement of underrepresented communities and Tribes
- C. Consider how the inconsistency of funding affects progress made in the IRWM program
 - Need more sustainable funding (not just state bond funding and general funds, foundation funding, alternative finance models, etc.)

Findings from the Grant Program

- D. Enhance the State's ability to support and work with underrepresented communities and Tribes
 - State agencies acknowledge the need to expand knowledge, understanding, awareness of local cultures and communities
- E. Consider alternative criteria for the allocation of State and local funding, such as:
 - Geography
 - Population size
 - Beneficiaries (people, ecosystems, water users)
 - Prioritized funding for those that have not previously received funding
 - Look beyond Median Household Income to define "disadvantaged" (e.g. consider affordability, census tracts)

Barriers to Equitable Inclusion

What is a "Changing Climate" from a Tribal Perspective?

- •Must include traditional and cultural values of all Communities
- Ensuring the Communities of Interest that they have autonomy in determining technical assistance and capacity building that meet their needs


